Cal Pierson, Past President of the Baltimore Mineral Society, will demonstrate rock polishing and display his rock collection at the Corner of the Past. It will be geared toward children and should be fun and educational for all.

Cal prospects for rocks out west and has quite a vast collection of rocks, fossils and minerals, including agate and petrified wood. He will explain how the wood became petrified and share other interesting information about rocks and minerals.

In addition to displaying part of his collection he will have free samples for children and will be demonstrating rock polishing. Fossils are plentiful in Door County. If you have a rock or fossil you are curious about, bring it and Cal will identify them for you. There will also be specimens available for purchase at modest prices.
