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On a chilly March morning, the Little Sister Resort Barn made its way from the resort, through the former Bay Ridge Golf Course, crossed Hwy 42, and continued east on Country Lane until it came to Hwy 57. At that point, the huge rig operated by the DeVooght movers, made a left turn and slowly, but surely, arrived at the property of the Corner of the Past where it made another left-hand turn on to the north end of the Corner of the Past property not far from where it will set down permanently once

foundation is constructed.

The move began about 7 am and arrived at the new home of the now "History Center of the Sister Bay Historical Society" at 4 p.m. Thus ending many years of "wishing we could have another barn" for housing large artifacts, storage of archival materials, public meeting space, enlarged office space, and display space. Much work remains now before the barn will be ready to be placed on its new permanent foundation.

The barn will be taller than as seen in the pictures as a

new first floor and siding will need to be constructed. Drawings are now being made for the necessary indoor architectural plans.

The SBHS wants to give recognition to two ladies who saw the opportunity for the Historical Society to obtain the barn. Preservationists, Stephanie Burke and Paula Anschutz did much for the Society to forge ahead with plans to move the barn with the expertise of the DeVooght Moving Company.

Christkindlmarkt Door County Returns for 2022

For anyone who was there – and it seemed like EVERYONE was there – the 1st Annual Christkindlmarkt Door County event felt SO comfortable and appropriate. Yes, it was largely outdoors, and it snowed at least briefly on all three weekends, but there was good hot food, largely German, hot Swedish Glogg, and most importantly, interesting Door County-based vendors, most offering either handcrafted or otherwise unique items as potential Christmas presents.

And there was music! Karen Mal, famously of Northern Sky Theater for many years, alternately performed with Zephyr Ciesar and Jeanne Kuhns, both with heavenly voices tuned to Mal's beautifully arranged sets of Christmas carols.



For every visitor, the food and drink was also special. Food vendors included McEvoy's Culinaria, who served an excellent grilled kielbasa and potato sausage plate that was prepared in a giant wok-like cooking pan. Thyme Restaurant and Catering served Swedish crusted ham and pecan salmon, while next door, Your Guest Chef served Austrian beef goulash and spaetzle.

When all was said and it done, even a rough count of attendees demonstrated that at least 10,000 people had come to the premiere of northern Door County's newest off-season evemt, proving that visitors WILL come to the county in November-December in large numbers...you just have to offer them an event that makes the winter drive worthwhile and special.

The event's Drinks Hut was wildly popular, quickly serving a custom recipe for Swedish Glogg in both handcrafted collector's mugs and logo-emblazoned wine cooler containers.



With that kind of success behind the organizers, Sister Bay Historical Society is now planning the 2nd Annual Christkindlmarkt. The scheduled dates are the weekends of November 25-27,

December 2-4, and December 9-11. The organizers say they are not planning to greatly expand the event in the second year, but will instead focus on making the event even better, with more convenient off-site parking, a new traffic flow plan in the Koessl food barn, a handful of fascinating new vendors, and the same blend of Christmas lights, folksy design, and welcoming volunteers that made it so popular in its first year.

The event is still a fundraiser for its host organization, the Sister Bay Historical Society, which hopes the event will eventually help assure even more financial stability for the group's building restoration and museum development activities in the years to come.



Now, if the organizers could only guarantee more of the fluffy snow that made the Christkindlmarkt grounds at Corner of the Past in Sister Bay so breathtakingly beautiful each and every day!

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A Recent Letter from Portland, OR

The SBHS recently received a delightful letter from the daughter of a former Sister Bay resident who lived here for a time in the 1930s. Perhaps some of our readers may remember her father.

Sandy Frankhauser Streit sent a large package of photos and postcards that her father Roy Frankhauser took while he was in Door County and was working for the Little Sister Resort. Sandy describes her "Pa" as quite a story- teller.

While working for the Andersons, he helped build a little building on the waterfront. Pa liked to say that his nose was so big he could hang from a limb by it and pick cherries with both hands. He told of the time he took a rowboat out to the island and got some gull eggs. He cooked them up only to find out they were too fishy.

Sometime during his careers, Pa went to Chicago and interestingly enough, actually began working on the large yacht named "Mizpah" that belonged to the Walgreen family. In WWII, the government took it over and refitted it. Pa knew the Ensign assigned to take the boat to Sturgeon Bay. It turned out that the Ensign didn't know enough about the boat so it ended up that the boat needed to be towed from Chicago to Sturgeon Bay to be fitted for the war.
