# TRAVELING EXHIBIT AT CORNER OF THE PAST

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From Monday, June 26
through Saturday, July 8, the
traveling exhibit "Great Lakes
Small Streams: How Water
Shapes Wisconsin," will be on
display in the Koessl Barn at
the Corner of the Past. The
exhibit, which is part of
the Wisconsin Historical
Society's DIVE IN initia-

Society's DIVE IN initiative, provides a history of water in Wisconsin from pre-historic times through the present.

Comprised of 16 panels, "Great Lakes Small Streams: How Water Shapes Wisconsin" features an interactive kiosk that allows visitors to track the movement of glaciers, follow changes made to local rivers over time, or seek out easy solutions to save water in their own homes. It will stimulate visitors to think about and discuss how people interact with the environment—with emphasis on how our relationship with water shaped Wisconsin's past and will continue to shape its future.



"The exhibit encourages guests to consider the many ways water has shaped our state, both geographically and as a driver for settlement and industry," said Kristen Leffelman, field services repre-

sentative for the Wisconsin
Historical Society and lead
curator of the exhibit. "From
there, it looks at how we have,
in turn, shaped our waterways,
highlighting some of the sustainability issues that chal-

lenge us today. Our water is such a rich resource and shaped our culture in so many ways. We want to share how it played and continues to play such an important part in our lives and livelihood," said Leffelman.

Admission to the exhibit will be the general adult fee of \$5.00 which includes all of the historic buildings. Children are free.

# COUSINS MEET IN SISTER BAY AFTER MANY YEARS

Mary Green, of Aurora, IL came to Sister Bay recently to tell the Historical Society about her grandmother, Olive C. Hendrickson Evenson, who was born in Sister Bay, November 22, 1906. Olive was the daughter of Andrew & Christian Hendrickson, who had 16 children (2 died at birth).

Olive, who moved from Sister Bay, became known for her love of dressing up at Christmas in a special dress & hat outfit, when she would visit children in hospitals and care centers giving them small gifts in the 1960s & 1970s.

At the time Mary came to Sister Bay, Andrew Hendrickson, of Sister Bay, was told about Mary and asked if he knew her. He could not recall knowing a Mary Green. So, we introduced the two and they realized they were cousins. Andrew's father was Joe Hendrickson owner of the Joe

Hendrickson Garage once at the corner of Mill Rd & 42. It seems, Mary's grandmother was Andrew's aunt, sister of his father Joe. With such a large family, Andrew knows he has not met all his cousins, although he & Mary had met once at a family funeral.

During this happy reunion, Mary agreed to don the green dress with fur collar and large fur hat (complete with plume) so we could take her picture. The Two exchanged Family information and agreed to get together again when Mary would return as she does once each year.

Andrew's parents were Joe & Louise Hendrickson. They had four children, John, Joann, Andy, and Christopher.

# THE SISTER BAY HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEEDS YOU!

In the past many of you have contributed to the Sister Bay Historical Society. It has been with your help that the Corner of the Past and Old Anderson House Museum are what they are today. You have played a vital role in preserving the history of the Village. And, you have helped create something unique in Door County: a site with sixteen restored historical buildings on garden-like grounds. If you haven't been there for awhile come over and take a look at what you have helped create.

A few years ago the Historical Society was the beneficiary of a bequest from the estate of Peg Foster. The initial distribution of the bequest was used to create an Operating Reserve Fund and an Endowment Fund within the Door County Community Foundation. The funds in the Foundation are managed by professionals who able to generate higher returns than we could on our own. The purpose of the Endowment Fund is to create a pool of funds that generate income. The larger the fund the more income it will generate.

The Operating Fund is intended to cover operating expenses of the Corner of the Past and the Old Anderson House Museum in the event Historical Society fails to receive sufficient funds from memberships, admission fees and donations. That is the position the Society has found itself in the past couple of years. As the result of residual distributions from Peg Foster's estate we have been able to cover the shortfall.

Obviously this cannot go on for long. This is where you come in. The Society is in need of your financial support. This can come in many

different forms. The most obvious is a direct donation. This can be a one-time donation, or for longer term support, a pledge of annual donations can be made. A pledge is simply a promise to give a designated amount of money for a designated number of years. Pledge forms are available, just ask any of the Society's Directors. Donations may also be made to either of our Community Foundation funds.

There are many other ways you can support our mission. On a long-term view would be the provision of a bequest in your estate planning, such as Peg Foster did. There are tax benefits of this method. There are several ways to provide a bequest. Your legal advisor can guide you through this. Instead of money, property can be donated such as stock or land. There are tax benefits with this method and again you should consult with your advisor to get specifics.

As I researched this subject I was surprised at the number of imaginative ways charitable support can take. Many of them don't apply to many people but I thought I would mention a few. A life insurance policy or an annuity can name the Society as the beneficiary. Individuals over 701/2 can make donations from their 401k. A charitable trust can be established. The list could go on. With any of these it is best to consult with a professional for guidance.

Sister Bay was incorporated as a separate governmental entity freeing it from Liberty Grove. The founders were dissatisfied with Liberty Grove's maintenance of roads in the village. It was




